<p>87% or more children from Year 4 to Year 6 take part in competitive sports competitions.</p> <p>2019 – 2020</p> <p>Year 4 - 90% of children took part in festivals or competitive competitions</p> <p>Year 5 – 100% of children took part in competitive competitions</p> <p>Year 6 – 87% of children took part in competitive competitions</p> <p>In 2019 – 2020, Castlefields offered 5 intra- house competitions and had 4 more planned which did not happen due to CV19.</p> <p>In 2019 – 2020, 100% of Pupil Premium children were offered places in Sports Partnership festivals or competitions.</p> <p>Year 5 maintained 100% of children taking the opportunity to take part in competitive sporting events.</p> <p>Year 6 (up to March 2020) had maintained their percentage involvement from last year of 87%.
